Print these letters ABA and have your child say which one is different. Continue using other letter combinations.	Read to your child an additional 15 minutes today.	Go for a walk with your child. Take turns counting your steps.	Let your child plan tomorrow's breakfast.
Have your child find 4 objects —flowers, leaves, or pinecones— and use them to make decorations for the table.	Have your child help make lunch. Give simple directions and see if he/she can follow them.	Listen to music with your child.	Have your child look through the newspaper and count all the pictures of turkeys.	Have your child test items to see which ones float and which do not.	Ask your child to find various letters on a page.	Help your child make a centerpiece for the table.
Take to your child about being thankful and ask what he/she is thankful for.	Write numbers 1-10 on pieces of paper. Allow your child to draw one and then count out that number of dried beans.	Put a small amount food on your child's tongue and have him/her describe it.	Have your child sort coins (pennies, nickels, dimes) and ask him/her how they are different.	Celebrate Thanksgiving with your family. Take time to read to your child today.	Have your child follow simple directions—clap, jump, hop, turn to the leftto the right.	Play a game with your child.
